New Landscaping to Improve Air Quality

On Friday, April 27, 2012, Century Villages at Cabrillo celebrated Arbor Day through the dedication of its Campus Landscape Barrier. The barrier is comprised of 191 carefully selected trees planted along the western perimeter of the CVC campus which borders the 103 Terminal Island Freeway. These trees form a landscape barrier, or “living air filter,” to make the air a little cleaner for residents, visitors and people who work here, including more than 400 children. These particular trees were chosen because they are good at capturing airborne particulates, pollution that is potentially harmful to breathe. Because the leaves of these trees have a relatively high amount of surface area, they have the ability to capture up to 85% of air pollutants. The trucks that travel to and from the local ports, railroads, freeways, factories, and refineries are all sources of airborne particulates near CVC.

Aside from being good “living air filters”, the trees selected are suitable for the Southern California climate and local soil conditions. The trees also feature other desirable qualities such as low Biogenic Volatile Organic Compounds (BVOC) emissions, an ability to sequester greenhouse gases, low maintenance requirements, and low allergenic output. When the trees mature they will range in height from 25 to 80 feet. In addition to helping capture air pollution, the trees will serve as an aesthetic improvement to the campus and will screen the industrial surroundings to the west. The trees will also help to reduce sound pollution from the freeway that permeates into the campus.



"We've had far too much air pollution and this project is about fighting back," commented 7th District Councilman James Johnson. "These are exciting days and transformative days for West Long Beach."

Councilman James Johnson served as our Master of Ceremonies at the dedication event. The day's festivities were attended by more than 100 guests; featured guests included Port of Long Beach Harbor Commissioner Nick Sramek, Bureau of Community Health Manager Susan Price, Port of Long Beach Environmental Specialist Associate Kirsten Berg, Executive Director of Comprehensive Child Development Tammie Kyle, and Program Facilitator for the Bethune Transitional Center Rhonda Haramis. Our most special guests of honor were the children of Comprehensive Child Development and the Bethune Transitional Center who captivated the audience with both a song and poem.

The Landscape Barrier project was truly a community effort. CVC would like to thank the 45 volunteers, including students and faculty, from Cornelia Connelly High School in Anaheim who helped to plant trees and spread mulch on March 27th. Also, CVC extends its gratitude to the City of Long Beach Green Youth workers who planted scores of trees over the course of two work days at the campus. Finally, CVC would like to especially thank the 20 resident volunteers from the Veterans Village Recovery Center who braved the scorching hot weather on April 20th and volunteered their time to spread mulch around the newly planted landscape barrier trees in preparation for the dedication event on April 27th.

CVC's Landscape Barrier is supported by a grant from the Port of Long Beach Mitigation Grant Program for Schools and Related Sites. In addition, the project received extensive financial and logistical support from the City of Long Beach including an AQMD grant. Through the Adopt-a-Tree fundraising program, the project counts on significant private support including donations from Long Beach Container Terminal, Warren E&P, BNSF Railway, SSA Marine, Thomas Safran & Associates, JPMorganChase Foundation, Meta Housing, 401(k) Advisors, Data Select Systems, EastWest Bank, ICON Builders, Irvine Valley Air Conditioning, and Frenkel & Company, among others.

Resident Spotlight: Ervin Bach

Ervin Bach is a resident of the Cabrillo Plaza, a 200 unit permanent housing complex for veterans here at Century Villages at Cabrillo (CVC). Ervin was born and raised in St. Louis, MO; his father was a brew master for Anheuser- Busch, and subsequently an alcoholic. Growing up in a dysfunctional home, at 18 Ervin decided to enlist in the U.S. Navy where he worked as a ship serviceman barber. Throughout his service, he traveled to many places such as the Mediterranean, Cuba, and Haiti to name a few.



In 1972, Ervin decided to visit his brother in California, and 47 years later he's still here. Throughout his adventures in California, he was a member of the first graduating class of the Vidal Sassoon Academy in San Francisco. He first came

to the CVC campus as a client of the Veterans Villages Recovery Center (VVRC). Ervin has successfully gone through the entire continuum of care for veterans here at CVC, first seeking recovery with the VVRC program, then receiving housing and services through our transitional housing program, and finally becoming entirely self-sufficient as a Cabrillo Plaza resident.

Ervin currently works on-site for U.S. Vets as a barber, helping clients look their best when seeking employment. He has been in the business for 43 years, and enjoys giving back to the program that helped him get to where he is today. He is continually pursuing knowledge, attending hair shows and taking college classes to ensure that he is current and well rounded within his field. He also takes a great interest in the arts, with his focus being in photography.

A New Home for the Elizabeth Ann Seton Residence



On Monday, March 19th, Catholic Charities of Los Angeles and Century Villages at Cabrillo celebrated the long anticipated Grand Opening of the expanded Elizabeth Ann Seton Residence. The new shelter complex replaces and expands the existing Elizabeth Ann Seton Residence which has operated at CVC since 1998. The new facility now located just past the entrance of the property at 2194 San Gabriel, features expanded capacity and more appropriate space for the provision of shelter and supportive services for homeless families, including safe and secure family dwellings, shared recreational play space, a community room, counseling offices, a commercial kitchen, and dining facilities.

The main goal of the Elizabeth Ann Seton Residence is to assist families as they transition from the crisis of being homeless to the stability of long-term housing. The program emphasizes setting realistic goals and gaining the resources and skills to become self-sufficient. Families stay 45 days in order to access stable housing. The new complex expands CVC's continuum of supportive housing

which fosters self-sufficiency and independence. As families matriculate from the shelter complex, they are eligible for the various transitional or permanent housing opportunities on the CVC campus.

The Grand Opening was very well attended and featured the Most Reverend Jose Gomez, Archbishop of the Archdiocese of Los Angeles, Oscar Solis, Auxiliary Bishop for the Archdiocese San Pedro Region, Suja Lowenthal, Vice Mayor of the City of Long Beach, Sean Rogan, Executive Director of the LA County Community Development Commission, Susan Price, Bureau Manager in the City of Long Beach Department of Health & Human Services, along with other local and State officials, Board members, partner agencies, current and former clients of the Elizabeth Ann Seton Residence, and friends and colleagues of both agencies. Vanessa Romain, Director of Programs for Catholic Charities' San Pedro Region, served as Mistress of Ceremonies.

The project cost \$5.0 million and was funded with seven distinct funding sources. CVC and Catholic Charities closed the financing package in December 2010, construction began in January 2011, and the shelters were opened in March 2012. This combined project has been more than eight years in the making, with CVC's original funding application submitted in 2004.

Ken Stuart Maintenance Lead

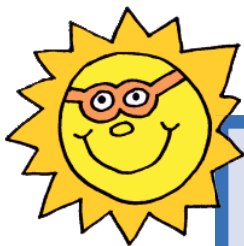


Ken was born in Compton, California, and grew up in La Mirada, California with three siblings. At the age of 17, Ken decided to leave high school early, take his GED and join the navy. It was 1977 when he began his military career as a medical support team member with the Fleet Marine Force (FMF). During the first 4 years of service, Ken provided medical support during Operation Eagle Claw (Iranian Hostage Crisis). After honorably completing his service, Ken attained his nursing license and worked as a trauma nurse at the Fountain Valley Medical Center. During this time he married his first wife and had two beautiful children two years apart; Kevin born in 1987 and Kelly in 1989.

After the AIDS scare of the mid 80's, Ken determined the safeguards at the hospital were not adequate, so he re-enlisted into the navy to attend the Naval Training Center in Great Lakes, Illinois to begin his education in engineering. After his schooling, Ken served 6 years on the USS Jarrett FFG-33 during Earnest Will Operations in the Persian Gulf and Operation Desert Shield/Storm. In 1992, Ken was promoted to Chief Petty Officer and served 2 years as an Advanced Electronics and Propulsions Engineer instructor and was then promoted to Chief of Curriculum Development for all of the US Navy's engineering schools. After close to 15 years of honorable military service, Ken returned home to take care of his ailing son and start his own business.

Over the years Ken has utilized his engineering, electrical and supervisory skills he gained during his military career, but his passion really lies more with the arts. Ken is an accomplished writer, poet, and musician. He was a top 10 blogger on Myspace, and had a following of more than 60,000 people listening to his music and spoken word poetry. Ken is a graduate of the US Vets Veterans in Progress program; today he serves as Maintenance Lead overseeing the maintenance of our CVC building, a 54 unit transitional housing complex for veterans.
