Have You Heard of SCIG?

In conjunction with the Port of Los Angeles, Warren Buffett's Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad (BNSF) has proposed to build the Southern California International Gateway (SCIG) project on the land directly adjacent to the Century Villages at Cabrillo community. The SCIG project will serve as a hub for trucks carrying containers from the Port to offload them onto trains that will ultimately transport those containers elsewhere. Proponents claim that the rail yard will be the greenest in the nation, that it will create thousands of jobs, and that it will help to improve regional air quality by eliminating truck traffic on the 710 freeway. However, many organizations dispute these "benefits" and point to the disproportionate environmental impacts of the project, in particular to West Long Beach neighborhoods and schools bordering the proposed facility.

This project has been nearly a decade in the making and while it now has the clearances to move forward it will likely be delayed by litigation. The City of Long Beach voted unanimously to sue the City of Los Angeles over the project. As Councilman Johnson noted, "Green growth means growing our economy while improving, not degrading, our neighborhoods. That is why L.A.'s proposed SCIG project on the border of Long Beach, which seeks regional growth by sacrificing our neighborhoods, is such a disappointing step backwards." Other organizations, such as the Natural Resources Defense Council, have also threatened litigation.

Throughout the environmental reporting process, CVC has participated by submitting its concerns about the project and the harmful effects it could have on our community. CVC's primary concerns include air quality, light and glare impacts, sound pollution (it will be a 24 hour facility), land use impacts on Century Villages, traffic congestion, and the proposed access to the SCIG. BNSF has proposed to access the SCIG via the Terminal Island cloverleaf that empties onto San Gabriel Avenue, the only way in and out of Century Villages. When the SCIG reaches its peak capacity this street will handle 5,500 trucks per day, nearly 4 trucks per minute. This figure was recently adjusted upward to 8,200 trucks per day, or nearly 6 trucks per minute. This proposed access could have devastating impacts on our community and represents a serious safety and health hazard.
